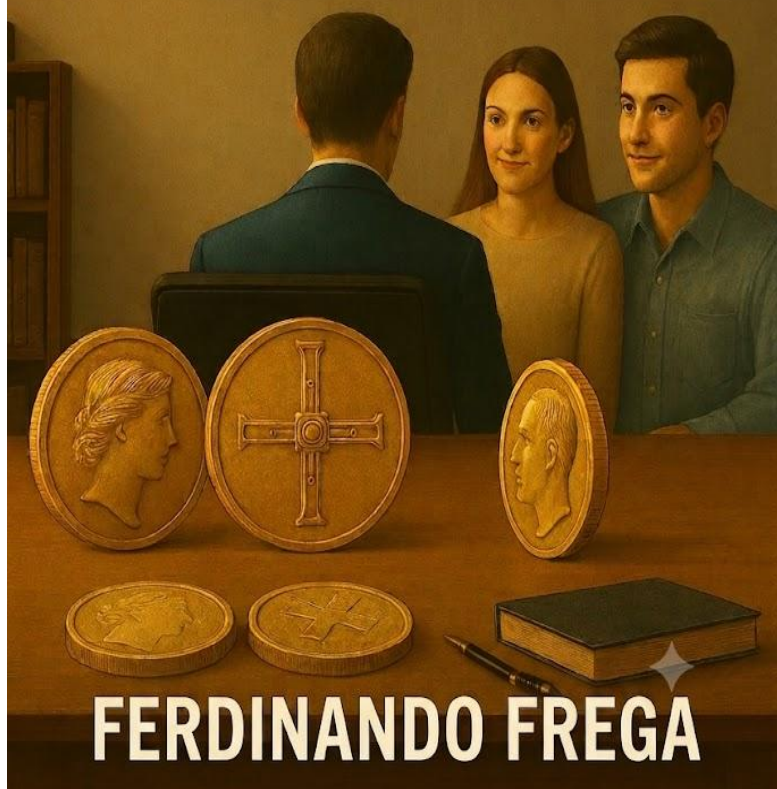

Every story is a face. Every face is tense. Every tension is a question that does not rush to find an answer.

Reading them will not be comfortable. But if something grates on you, if a sentence sticks with you, if an image

haunts you, then it means you are reading with an open heart.

And in that case, these stories are yours too.

Seduction And Abandonment

Political, social, cultural, emotional seduction, whatever it may be, is a complex phenomenon that involves various aspects of personal, communicative, and human influence.

This theme explores how those who apply it have a great responsibility, where it is easy to encounter cultural figures who use it as a persuasive strategy to gain consensus, shape opinions, and influence behaviors.

It is a complex and far from simple topic, which allows us to understand the type of social movement the world develops, between reality, mystification, dreams, and false expectations.

The political one is the most evident, using rhetoric, oratory, symbolism, images, promises, and visions.

Social innovation adapts progress to new techniques and makes use of the media, communication, social movements, norms, and values.

The cultural sector affects a small audience, since schooling in the world is the second plague after hunger, putting forward art, entertainment, fashion, trends, education, and knowledge.

Emotional loss, which never lasts on the list, is managed within a small number of people, often in family

environments, where the natural consequence is abandonment, the only moment of genuinely great pain.

Personally, I have been fortunate enough to have been seduced several times, an amazing feeling, but I considered it extremely easy since we men are tied to only two priorities: intimacy and food, and it was not difficult to pursue them.

But I've always remembered the three sides of the coin; some might be quick to call me a charlatan, based on their knowledge that reveals a coin has only two sides, but instead I maintain that the coin has three sides, and that's exactly what it is.

The first side is heads, the second is tails, and the third is when the coin stands upright expressing its third side, the best or commonly called tolerant one.

It is certainly an introspective vision, linked to geometric figures, but it is still a reality to which we can refer, considering that seduction in love is the first possibility and intent that leads to communion, while abandonment is the result of a rupture, something destroyed that can never be repaired.

Returning to my emotional experience, I have always handled situations rationally, remembering my grandfather when he said that, if I had doubts about my thoughts, I should look at the fist of my hand, it was the parallel with the shape of my heart, and I would find everything I was looking for inside, without hurting anyone.

You must know how to use words, how to place them in the right order; if you make a mistake, you have gained nothing, only lost.

Free Thoughts

"Thoughts" represents a journey into the intimacy of the human mind, exploring the reflections, emotions, and ideas that accompany us daily. It is a theme that encompasses a variety of content that reflects the complexity and beauty of our existence, demonstrating that we have no mental limits in our processing and capabilities.

The areas in which we can act and be an integral part of situations are:

- **Daily:** moments of tranquility and fleeting thoughts.
- **Emotions and feelings:** joy and happiness, sadness, and pain.
- **Ideas and projects:** creativity and innovation, ambitions, and goals.
- **Philosophical reflections:** meaning of life, morality, and ethics.
- **Interactions and relationships:** interpersonal relationships, social connections.

The first piece of information I would like to share is that 80% of humanity considers the heart the most important organ in the human body. Well, that is not the case. The true and only central player in our lives is the brain, an organ that weighs 1.5 kg and without which nothing can exist, without which there is no possibility of continuity.

At a medical convention a few years ago, doctors agreed that the Italian male population had prioritized the care of their sexual organs, investing in treatments and therapies. At the

end of the meeting, the university rector left us with a reflection: in 20 years, everyone will be sexually active, but no one will know what to do.

A thought helps you with other things, too. We deliberately did not mention dreams, the only loyal friends in the battle against depression and anxiety; while you are obviously learning, you still have the chance to have tried.

I had been thinking about her for years, dreaming about her every night. She was fantastic, unique, the woman of my dreams. One morning she knocked on my door. I went to open it, still half asleep. I saw her come in, and I was happy. Then, when I woke up, I realized it was my grandmother, 94 years old, and I immediately realized that thoughts need to be managed carefully, otherwise you are ruined.

The Village of The Country

I was invited on Sunday evening to an art presentation in a suburb of my hometown. The teacher and organizer had seen me the previous evening at another event and was impressed. Too bad she was very mature, short, lacking youthful freshness and shape, but beautiful and highly intelligent.

He said, "Come, I'll offer you a piece of lemon cake at the end of the evening," as if he knew I was fond of it. The table of speakers was already well set, and I found a spot among the audience seats in the last seat near the entrance, so I could see who was arriving and participating.

This event helped me memorize ten new themes, to which I will later dedicate my reflections to this book:

But returning to the villages, after listening to speakers and historians, no one spoke of what I knew and understood. I was careful not to express it there, but I intend to bring it to life in my letters.

Villages arose in small population densities, considering they are a European and South American phenomenon. Using a special compound of mud, grass, and stone, the people built with the chamber wall technique: two parallel walls of special composite, with a hollow center, thus facilitating the regulation of seasonal temperatures outside compared to the interior.

These structures were built without a master plan, and one morning a passageway might be three meters wide, and the next day it might be just one meter wide. The protrusions and recesses were part of family needs without any logic, since inside the home, the only thing that mattered was how many children there were and where they slept.

Many of the expanding villages initially formed neighborhoods and then, based on population density and territorial extension, became districts, hamlets, and finally towns. A European phenomenon, linked to the people who had conquered us, to our history that unfortunately could not be forgotten.

History And Origins

It is the fabric that connects the past to the present and charts the path to the future. It allows us to better understand our origins, our evolution, and the lessons learned along the way, exploring their importance in shaping our individual and collective identity.

Each theme has its own content, but I only want to point them out for information purposes, as the author has no historical content, but in summary we can consider it in these terms:

- **Origins and Roots:** The First Civilizations; Traditions and Cultures.
- **Key Historical Events:** Revolutions and Social Changes; Conflicts and Wars.
- **Historical Figures:** Leaders and Innovators; Heroes and Heroines.
- **Evolution of Societies:** Technological and Scientific Advances; Cultural Changes.
- **Memory and Identity:** Heritage and Historical Monuments; Reflections on the Past.
- **Lessons Learned:** Understanding Mistakes; Inspiration for the Future.

By identifying six fundamental and pivotal points, we have a guideline for understanding history, because often we do not

know the whys of certain things. All wars of the past, present, and future have been fought and will be fought for only one reason: food. When people are hungry, they have no time to reason, because an empty stomach inhibits brain processing, and everyone becomes like sheep, where one goes on the attack and the others follow.

But looking at history, we see the great peoples who shaped history: the Romans, the Celts, the religious, the political. Because the passage of just a single second is enough for what happened before to become history.

There's no point in telling you about fire, primitive people, fiefdoms, or romanticism, because only by reading can we capture those moments, relive them, and say: thank you, Lord, for having created me today, for defeating Covid, for Pasteur inventing penicillin, for medical advances, for computers, for a longer quality of life, all thanks to history.

A bit like telling my friends that if I am like this today and they appreciate me it is only the result of the experiences I have had, and I bring and tell them my story.

INDIVIDUAL FREEDOM

Freedom is one of the most profound and fundamental concepts of the human condition. It is the right to live according to one's will, to express one's ideas, and to choose one's own path without constraints. This essay explores different angles of the concept of freedom, from its human and philosophical definition to its historical and contemporary relevance, and the ways to preserve it.

- **Philosophical Theories:** Discussion of various philosophical theories of freedom.
- **Universal Declarations of Human Rights:** How they proclaim and protect freedom.
- **Civil Rights:** Freedom of expression, assembly, religion, and the press.
- **Economic Freedom:** The right to engage in economic and market activities.
- **Freedom of Movement:** The right to move freely within and across national borders.
- **Freedom of Expression:** Ideas and opinions without fear of repression.
- **Personal Freedom:** Issues such as the freedom to make decisions about one's health, education, and career.
- **Spiritual Freedom:** The right to have one's own faith and to be an atheist or agnostic.
- **Psychological Freedom:** Inner freedom, without fear, trauma, and mental constraints.

I felt I had covered all the main points about freedom, but there were three elements that needed to be addressed in more detail:

The Ability

to Make Individual Choices About One's Body, Lifestyle, and Relationships:

Achieving this goal is complex, since in shared projects between two people, one always tends to prevail over the other. In a democracy, this is called bullying, but in love, it is a relationship that works.

Exploring Practices

and Philosophies That Promote Mental and Emotional Freedom:

These concern those who have an evolved brain size, whether it is too evolved or highly involuted, in any case, excellent resources for psychiatrists.

The Importance

of Tolerance and Mutual Respect:

These are the first true educational factors. Behavior, shaped by genes and education, which unfortunately we inherit at birth and are not interchangeable.

I could not have concluded this reflection without mentioning a quote from Schopenhauer. At the age of forty-two, he decided to live in solitude. He died at the age of seventy-two, and on his deathbed, he expressed his final thought: "Remember, Ralph, a man is truly free only when he lives in solitude, the only time when he does not have to explain his actions."

PROLOGUE

The Man and The Dog

For a few months, I had a girlfriend who had a dachshund. Every time he saw me, the dog would bark and, if he could,

he would even bite me. Animals sense things that humans do not: they know if we love animals, what our inner self is, and our predisposition to share petting, walking, and cuddles with them.

Shortly afterward, this elderly dog, now almost eighteen years old, died, and my girlfriend's grief was immense. She cried constantly and incessantly searched for photos of the dog, unable to forget him. I made a promise: when we got married, we would get another dog, a male, small. We chose a Beagle.

After only twenty days of marriage, I found the dog on my bed, in my spot. I tried to explain that he was busy, but his languid eyes begged for support. My wife made him sleep in the middle of the bed like a baby.

Meanwhile, my wife was expecting twins, an extraordinary commitment, but the dog stayed at home. Do not be fooled by anyone who questions this: no matter what day or weather, my wife made the right amount of time for him, too.

My job kept me away from home Monday through Friday, and conversations with my wife were exclusively over the phone. We talked about the kids, the in-laws, and the dog. After about two years, I remember it was a Tuesday, when my wife called me at a client's office, out of breath and worried. Our dog would pace the 40-foot hallway all day, constantly throwing himself on the floor, worrying my wife, who did not know what to do.

That night I came home, but the dog would not stop. The next morning, we rushed to the vet, worried that he was sick and wondering what medication to give him to calm him down.

The vet, a friend of mine from our youth tennis days, started laughing and would not stop. I asked him, "Pippo, tell me what's going on." He replied, "Well, the dog is in heat. Now I'll give him a shot and he'll calm down."

My wife was happy and calm. I reflected on the fact that, even when I found myself in similar situations, I did not make such a fuss, this emergency, and that fortunately, a single shot would not have been enough for me.

All this is just for a dog, man's best friend but my wife's friend.

The Photographer

The first thing I asked this photography professional was which he considered more important: a real photograph or a constructed one, an impromptu one or a historical one, a young one or an old one? He looked at me in the face, waited at least five minutes, and then asked me my name and my profession, trusting that few people made this kind of analysis and distinction, and that it was not common among many.

"A photograph expresses an emotion," he said, "and you can stop and look at it for hours; it will convey to you many things that the human mind does not immediately grasp."

"Today, our most important work is weddings, followed by baptisms, communions, and birthdays. A few artistic events, a fashion show, are unlikely in our latitudes due to the lack of fashion houses, but we do produce many passport photos. It should also be said that many people, faced with the prospect of dying, want to have their funeral photos taken while they are alive, and they will pay any price for it.

I remember a lady in her eighties who asked me for a photo of her gravestone, no matter the price, which had to have the characteristic that, whoever saw it, would think she was still alive.

And then there are some legal inquiries into real estate auctions or photos of previous criminal activities, where the judge requests additional documentation. Finally, many come here to have their photos taken, demanding filters that make them appear younger. This is to gain traction in new romantic relationships; the most investigated are women, who would sell their souls to the devil to appear different, younger, but also thinner.

This is the magic of my work, of my life. Behind a lens, I watch the world go by, and then, coming home, my wife says, 'Take out the trash.'

The Sheep and The Shepherds

Sheep are irreplaceable companions on humanity's journey. We do not know which came first, but the union between man and sheep has always represented a bond of immense importance and necessity.

Carefully led by faithful sheepdogs, these creatures are led from the prairies to the sheepfolds, always under watchful protection to avoid danger and loss. Their milk and wool, which they renew seasonally, are precious resources in the economies of many regions.

A shepherd knows his flock perfectly, recognizing each member even in large numbers. When a sheep is sick or pregnant, he knows exactly how to care for it, with the dedication of a specialized nurse. The relationship between

shepherd and sheep is so profound that an English woman told her husband, "Love me as a shepherd loves his sheep." Unfortunately, her request was not well understood, and she ended up in a psychiatric ward.

A shepherd's strength and power are often measured by the number of sheep he owns, sometimes leading him to make nocturnal raids to steal animals from neighbors, branding them as his own. Some regions, such as those in Europe and Australia, celebrate sheep-rearing traditions with contests and competitions, such as the fastest shearer.

In these stories, sheep graze peacefully, oblivious to human competition, and provide us with milk and wool. One day, a ram, eager to mate but held back by the shepherd, decided to buy flowers to win over a sheep. Thus, that quiet sheepfold became a meeting place for love.

What a fascinating life, that of my sheep!

Female Courtship

When I decided to address this topic, I went back in history to the early 1900s and observed how men were accustomed and accustomed to courting. Without such an exhilarating, precise, and refined activity, a man does not stand out, he does not fight, and when he thinks he has achieved something, he often does not realize he is brought home little of real value.

We are speaking clearly about the courtship of women, be they friends, girlfriends, wives, lovers, mothers-in-law, aunts, or grandmothers. The world of women is vast and limitless, like a vast field enclosed by barbed wire, where

only the most capable emerge victorious and enjoy the fruits of their victory.

Impossible women do not exist. There are women of character and intelligence who need capable men, capable of appreciating and leveraging their intelligence. That is why, in my forty years of traveling the world, I have never failed women, always finding consistency in behavior, avoiding lies and promises, and focusing only on the facts, the ones that truly matter.

When you look at a woman on the street, she is prepared and communicates her state of mind, her goal, her priority. Whether she is looking for money or a dowry, it is a constant hunt, and we men are the prey, forced to sell our lives to the highest bidder. Never giving everything away at once is the first big mistake men make, and never revealing your financial capacity is crucial. It is like playing a slot machine without knowing when the game will end.

Remember that we come from a woman and are constantly seeking a woman. This often leads to poor choices, so never have children simply out of selfishness. We must bring children into the world and not abandon them but love them because they are the fruit of what we have decided to do. It all starts with courtship.

The Kiss Due

According to anthropologists, the origins of kissing seem to date back to prehistoric times, when women, to feed their babies, would crush food in their mouths and then pass it to their children in a sort of kiss. A gesture like what birds still do today with their young, but fortunately without the

regurgitation. Even primitive people, when kissing, hid for fear of journalists.

A kiss is one of the most intimate and meaningful acts two people can share, capable of expressing a wide range of emotions, from love and passion to affection and comfort. The history of the kiss is ancient and varied, with diverse cultures interpreting it in unique ways.

The earliest recorded forms of kissing date back to Roman times, where kissing on the hand was a sign of reverence and observance, reserved for emperors. This gesture continued in the papal oligarchies of the time, among bishops, cardinals, and popes, and later in fiefdoms, baronies, criminal associations, and secret societies.

It is also an opportunity to evaluate how much we are being appreciated, whether we are good kissers, and whether we are paying careful attention to our breath, the true enemy of kissing.

Kissing is much more than just a touch of lips; it is a universal language of affection and connection that continues to evolve and fascinate.

Malicious Stairs

When I first started going to church in the evenings for pre-marriage classes, I always entered through the sacristy, a door in the left corner, and I was not yet familiar with this new spiritual temple. On my wedding day, my grandmother accompanied me, a tall, 80-year-old woman who resembled Alan Ford because of her perpetually gray hair. When the car dropped us off on the street leading to the church, my heart leaped, wondering: when will we get to the top? I counted 420 steps, and I have not been back since.

I was always comfortable with stairs; I lived on the third floor as a youngster and had no difficulty. As I grew older, my father immediately took care of installing an elevator, and my only difficulty was having to climb the manual stairs at home to change a few light bulbs.

I remember one day when a cousin of my mother's came to visit. I asked her if she could help me change some curtains by climbing the stairs, and she agreed. She treated me to a ten-minute view, but then she came downstairs and I had to go up. Pretending to fall onto the bed, I hugged her for a long time. The rest is indescribable.

At my job, during a meeting in Milan, I was asked in front of an audience of 250 people what steps to success were. The answer was simple and made everyone smile: "Success is all about embracing it and never letting go, as if it were the most beautiful woman, you've ever met."

Stairs, as simple in their function as they are fundamental to our daily lives, are present in many aspects of our existence, from the simple ascent to the next floor to the creation of complex architecture. Stairs allow us to overcome differences in level, allowing us to move from one floor to another.

Every written word was an attempt. An attempt to understand, to tell, to not lie. This book does not close a circle. It opens it. Because the restless mind does not stop. It continues to observe, to desire, to search. And between these pages, you have found a fragment of yourself. I do not ask you to share it. I only ask you not to forget it.

WHY THIS BOOK?

This book was born out of a need: to give form to internal disorder, to recount what has no place in orderly discourse, to give voice to what normally remains under the skin.

It was not written to explain, but to disturb. Not to teach, but to question.

The three divisions—*Justice*, *Judicial Authority*, *Law*—are not just themes: they are worlds. Worlds that brush against each other, collide, and ignore each other. Worlds that dwell within each of us, even if we pretend not to see them.

Each chapter is a fragment of reality, a point of view that does not claim to be objective, but authentic. Each specimen is a face, a voice, a tension.

I authored this book because I cannot stand simplifications. Because complexity is the only honest way to tell the story of humanity. Because contradictions should not be resolved: they should be inhabited.

And I authored this book for those who have thought too much, for those who have felt too much, for those who are not content to float on the surface of things.

If you recognize yourself in a sentence, in a face, in a scratch
— then this book is yours too.
