INTRODUCTION

Every country exists on two stages: the visible one, where big names, headlines, and televised handshakes parade; and the invisible one, populated by professionals who hold the curtain without ever stepping into the limelight. This book focuses on the second stage.

I have chosen to look at institutions from the most uncomfortable angle: the people. Not from the perspective of the technician, the politician, or the bureaucrat, but from that of those who endure endless queues, impossible paperwork, decisions made far away with immediate repercussions. It is from there that the "thousand invisible professions" reveal themselves for what they are: necessary, poorly paid, sometimes ridiculous, yet crucial.

The method is simple: describe roles, dismantle perceptions, and attack them with ironic and merciless commentary. Not to demolish individuals, but to expose the gap between the official image and everyday reality. These pages feature elegantly dressed ambassadors and clerks circulating forgotten archives; firefighters risking their lives and officials risking nothing but gastritis; judges walking the tightrope of the law and translators saving negotiations with a comma.

Invisibility is not neutral. Sometimes it is protection, sometimes condemnation, always a convenience for those in power. Making the invisible visible does not mean celebrating it, but rather giving it a human face, with all the contradictions that it entails.

Do not expect an encyclopedia: there are no neutral definitions here, but distorting mirrors. Irony is the blade that cuts, the popular voice is the ink, and reality is more theatrical than any invention.

If you recognize yourself in this, know that you are not alone. If you get angry, so much better: this book is not meant to put you to sleep, but to wake you up.

Every invisible profession is a cog. Some rusty, others vital, all indispensable. The paradox is that the more hidden they are, the more they keep the machine running.

Ambassador

Personal comment: Who would have thought that behind the etiquette lies so much diplomacy... and a few watered-down coffees? The man I met was trying to seduce my close friend, the wife of a foreign minister, but I countered his elegance with the guerrilla spirit of the intuitive Calabrian.

The result? Nothing to do but fall into line and not ask who I was but find out who I was.

Console

It looks after the interests of citizens abroad and manages consular services.

Perception: The silent hero of those who lose their passport or find themselves in trouble far from home. Sometimes he seems like a tour guide with bureaucratic superpowers.

Comment: He who loses his passport prays for it, but the consul saves him... with a forced smile.

Political Advisor

Provides analysis and strategies on international relations.

Perception: The brain behind the scenes, the one who reads between the lines and whispers crucial advice. Sometimes he seems like a psychoanalyst for foreign governments.

Comment: He knows everything before anyone else... it is a shame that no one always listens to him.

Diplomatic

Negotiates, mediates, represent the state in negotiations and conferences.

Perception: The master of elegant compromise, able to smile while solving impossible problems.

Comment: Always elegant, even when inside he is grumbling about yet another international mess.

Interpreter/Translator

It ensures linguistic understanding between states and institutions.

Perception: The keen ear that knows more languages than the politicians it translates. It can save negotiations... or ruin them with a small mistake.

Personal comment: True power lies in silence and the right words. But be careful: often, when true understanding is lacking, those in that situation at that moment say whatever comes to mind, and do not report the actual statements.

Foreign Policy Analyst

Studies international scenarios, prepares reports and forecasts.

Perception: Eyes on maps, graphs, and bulletins. Lives between hypotheses and reality, between anxiety and geopolitical excitement.

Comment: The worst scenarios are always other people.

International Law Expert

Advises on global treaties, conventions, and regulations.

Perception: The moral judge of governments, he knows what can and cannot be done. Sometimes irritating, always indispensable.

Personal comment: Read books bigger than life itself. But do not be like my colleague, who toured 108 countries as a do-it-yourself tourist, finding the best local women, and

eventually signing his business cards as "international expert"... but he was just an inexperienced ignoramus with a business card.

Commercial Officer / Foreign Trade

It supports companies and promotes international trade.

Perception: The bridge between economics and diplomacy. Seen as the "bridge salesman" connecting worlds.

Personal comment: If the bridge holds, everyone is happy... if it collapses, everyone rushes to find it. But to lower the risk threshold, it is better to rely on ugly but intelligent women: they have that extra edge that always guarantees you the ride.

Head of Relations with International Organizations

Manages contacts with the UN, EU, NATO, etc.

Perception: Someone who knows all the acronyms and corridors of global power. Sometimes he seems like a living encyclopedia.

Comment: Always ready to explain what an acronym means... and how to save yourself from it.

Conclusion

"Internally, just to let you know that they look inside you first, and then, if necessary, they look you in the face. Between checks, permits, and prohibitions, it is the ministry that reminds you that your freedom is a relative concept. Here, they decide who walks confidently and who walks

anxiously. Everyone knows it, but few admit it: true power is invisible, and the greatest fun is making it seem necessary."

OF THE INTERIOR

The Ministry of the Interior is the lens through which we observe the fragility and strength of a nation. Here, we do not just make laws and checks: we touch the daily lives of every citizen, from the narrowest alley in the city to the beating heart of its institutions. Police, prefectures, civil defense: men and women who represent the boundary between order and chaos, security, and fear.

These are not faceless heroes or invisible bureaucrats: these are people called upon to make choices that impact on the freedoms, responsibilities, and trust of the community. In this chapter, you will find not empty praise, but necessary truths: the Ministry of the Interior is a mirror of the society it seeks to govern, and every one of its actions says something about us.

Provocative? Yes, because the challenge is to look beyond the facade, to understand that security is not just repression, and that control is not just order. It is respect for social life, its collective responsibility, it is the thin thread that holds Italy together.

Operational Officers

They enforce laws and regulations, manage practices and protocols.

Staff: Administrative officials, inspectors, and those assigned to specific sectors (e.g., control and supervision, registers, contributions).

Narrative Highlight: Here, work often becomes a deadly routine, with small powers that seem enormous but pay off with nothing more than stress.

Employees

Managers

Senior Executives / General Secretaries

Overall management of a Ministry, inter-ministerial coordination, political and public contacts.

Staff: Secretaries General, Directors General, Cabinet Heads.

Narrative Highlight: They live in a world of prestige and official travel, but often far from the reality of the citizens and with salaries that do not correspond to their true load of responsibilities.

Specialist Offices

Technical and regulatory support to ministries, research, planning, risk prevention, fund management.

Staff: Analysts, auditors, legal experts, statisticians, protocol, and ceremonial office.

Narrative Highlight: They work in the shadows, producing reports on everything, but no one really knows what they are doing until trouble strikes.

Administrative and Logistics

Management of materials, infrastructure, resources, internal security, and anti-crisis protocols.

Staff: Warehouse workers, maintenance workers, drivers, security operators, IT technicians.

Narrative Highlight: They work "behind the scenes," invisible but crucial; often victims of bureaucracy and favoritism.

Political Cabinets (not strictly political)

Coordination with political bodies, drafting official documents, relations with the press and public opinion.

Staff: Advisors, spokespeople, communications officers, cabinet secretaries.

Narrative highlight: Where work becomes strategic, but also more hypocritical: appearances matter more than action.

Police Headquarters – 21 Area Cage

The Policemen

He is the daily cog in the police station's cogs, the man (or woman) who sees everything, hears everything, takes notes, and, when necessary, acts quietly. Sometimes a silent hero, other times a simple official dreaming of retirement while signing forms and reports. Life puts him to the test with citizens, criminals, and superiors; his power is concrete, tangible, made of uniform, badge, and gun. But he often goes unnoticed, except for the dramas he must manage and the responsibilities he bears.

He knows how to read the streets better than anyone else. He knows when to speak, when to remain silent, and when a single gesture can change everything. Yet not everything he does is understood: the power of a blue ID card, a metal plaque, and a double stack 9mm Beretta model 51/bis remains only a memory of what once was.

The police officers who retire or who did so between 2000 and 2010 are the product of a strange era: a middle school diploma was all that was needed to enter the force. Only after 1984 were competitive exams introduced, and the bar was raised only to select those who genuinely wanted to advance their careers. Poor education produced mediocre qualities, and only a few made a career out of the right face, the right marriage, or the personal strength developed after years of challenging work.

And then there are those like me. I took the exam, with a middle school diploma, and I won... but I did not accept the job. Hahahaha! I have seen it all, from the inside and the outside, without ever having to bend my freedom to the rules of the system. That badge, that gun, those daily gestures of power... they are no longer of any use.

And then I taught at American universities, speaking five languages, and if I thought I would find a similar position at the police station, it would only be as a drug-sniffing dog. Hahahaha

Yet, many will look for me first and understand the book later. Because the missing piece from the police station, the one that really matters, was me.

Passport Office

People scrutinizing you as if they were reading your life rather than your ID. Every stamp feels like a judgment, every line a test of patience and nervous endurance.

Perception: Frustration and anxiety mixed with impotence. If you lose weight—as happened to me—you risk never returning home, because they tell you the passport photo no longer belongs to you.

Personal comment: And yet, it is there that you understand how bureaucracy can turn an ordinary person into a detective of his own identity. Oh, and remember no one will save you if you do not know how to smile at the right official... or at least try to convince them you are still you, even without the beard and a few pounds less.

Foreigners' Office

Where the world intersects and time seems to expand. They scrutinize you, question you, listen to you, and archive you.

Perception: suspended between curiosity and isolation. The limitation of speaking foreign languages remains, and sometimes even the limitation of one's native language, but often the solution is found by asking someone for support in exchange for something. We are Italians, we are this too.

Family Office

Where private dynamics become state practices. Dramas are read behind a signed form.

Perception: Tenderness mixed with disillusionment, private life, and open books. Greater attention is paid to those with children to protect.

Prevention Office (Earth)

They monitor, report, and warn, often invisible until an emergency.

Perception: Constant vigor and latent tension, protection like a silent burden. Prevention is always better than cure, but it always depends on the person.

Health Office (Land)

Rapid treatment, cold protocols, but always a focus on human distress.

Perception: Between dedication and bureaucratic indifference, healthcare is under scrutiny. Often in the hands of people with no qualifications, only merits and no professional classification, just ad hoc assignments to fill the gaps.

Dog Units

The faithful gaze of the animals accompanies rigorous training. Dog and agent, a bond of silent understanding.

Perception: Intense collaboration and mutual devotion. The task is entrusted to people who love animals in general and dogs in particular, whose dedication is priceless, limitless, and often goes unrecognized.

Escorts and Drivers Office

Life is a race, between sirens and responsibilities. Every journey is a test of concentration and composure.

Perception: High stress, adrenaline, and a sense of concrete usefulness. They only work if others are willing to work and move.

Maritime Operations Office

Monitoring ports, ships, and suspicious traffic. Water hides what land does not reveal.

Perception: Constant vigilance and diligence.

Anti-Drug Office (Sea)

Where hands tremble and documents tell stories of desperation.

Perception: Conflict between justice and brutal reality.

Rescue / Intervention Team

Always ready to jump into the water to save lives. The daily heroism that no one sees.

Perception: Tension and invisible gratitude.

Port Control Office

Where can every container tell a story of crime or hope?

Perception: Rigorous vigilance and a constant analytical mind.

Air Operations Office

The air as a territory of surveillance and discreet power.

Perception: Control and limited freedom, the sky as a border.

Flight Department (elite)

Fast-moving professionals are often admired but never recognized.

Perception: Excellence, tension, and the loneliness of those who fly high.

Anti-Drug Unit / Flight Control

Where skies and traffic intertwine, and the law follows invisible routes.

Perception: Vigilance in flight, anxiety, and responsibility combined.

Postal Police Office

A top-down structure that monitors and verifies direct correspondence between all the world's police forces to prevent acts that are anti-personal in relation to IT and digital postal processes.

Perception: Low consideration in Italy where everyone does not care about everyone else.

Comment

All these angels and bureaucrats struggle with adrenaline, stress, and protocol... but none of them truly deserve the salary they earn. Except the dog at the dog club: at least he gets free cuddles.

All the police friends I have had have always investigated who I was and what I was doing, and sometimes they were the ones who suggested illegal activities. But my grandfather, in life, always said one thing: "**With the police officers, you eat and you cross paths... but don't sleep.**"

FIREFIGHTER - NBCR Unit

NBCR Office – Planning and Coordination

Perception: An environment where strategy merges with the reality of emergencies. Every decision can mean the difference between life and death.

Comment: Here we draw maps of uncertainty, where every scenario is potentially a nightmare that must be faced with clarity.

NBC Intervention Unit

Perception: Highly specialized teams, ready to enter contaminated areas with sophisticated equipment and protective suits.

Commentary: The silent heroes who face the unknown, where every step could be the last if not calibrated with precision.

Mobile Analysis Laboratory

Perception: A laboratory unit that moves into the field to analyze suspicious substances in real time.

Comment: The beating heart of field diagnosis, where science meets urgency and precision is vital.

Decontamination Unit

Perception: Teams dedicated to removing contamination from people, vehicles, and equipment.

Comment: The first step towards safety, where every action is calibrated to prevent the spread of dangerous agents.

Communication and Monitoring Center

Comment: The operational mind that connects every unit in the field, ensuring a timely and coordinated response.

Psychological Support Unit

- **Team Leader:** Leader on the field, responsible for the safety of the team.
- **Operational Fire Brigade:** Direct intervention in fires, technical rescue, road accidents.

Comment: Underestimated in humanity, often overestimated in guilt. Irony: those who err always seem like the protagonists of a tragic soap opera. But the true culprit is the one who failed to dismantle the accusation

with facts, the only true evidence on which jurisprudence is based.

Penitentiary Police

As custodians of detention facilities, the Penitentiary Police manage internal security, accompany inmates, and maintain daily order in prisons. They are the bridge between law, society, and rehabilitation, confronting tensions and conflicts every day within concrete walls.

Yet, between 1970 and 1975, I went there almost three times a week. Not as an inmate, but to understand, observe, and experience the tension of that microcosm. I stopped at the food store, sometimes I snooped around the cells, just to get a sense of where those who make mistakes end up.

My father was friends with the prison warden and the marshals at the San Pietro penitentiary in Reggio Calabria. They always met for their card game, amidst smiles and teasing, with the inevitable loser always paying. I sat next to him, observing everything. When he did not accompany me to the bathroom, I ended up urinating on my pants, amidst the desperate cries of my mother when he returned.

In the morning at school, the teacher would ask me what I had done the day before. I would reply, "I was in prison with my father." She asked only twice in five years. And then that was it. No one could understand, no one could truly judge what I was seeing.

Prison Director

Who manages the balance between control and humanity behind bars?

Perception: Authority and fragility coexist. Controlling the lives of others requires a firm hand and a watchful heart. The loneliness of power is surprising.

Comment: The responsibility is enormous and invisible. Ironic: knowing where everyone is always does not make you happier... just more stressed.

Education Centers

Places of recovery, training, and reintegration for those who have made mistakes.

Perception: Spaces of hope undervalued but essential. Seeing a smile after months of resistance is a small victory that warms the heart. Here, every gesture, even the smallest, counts.

Comment: Educating those who have made mistakes is an invisible art. Irony: more smiles than hammers but not always recognized.

Reintegration

Paths that help people return to society after punishment.

Perception: Places of rebirth and tension. Hope coexists with uncertainty: learning to live again is an emotional undertaking, where every small step is a triumph.

Comment: Bringing someone back to life is underrated, but crucial. Ironically, it is often more complicated than getting a new printer to work in court.

Judges

He decides the fate of others, balancing law, and humanity.

Perception: Seen from the outside as implacable demigods, feared and respected. Behind the robe, however, every sentence weighs on the heart: coffee is never enough to counter the sleepless nights spent pondering the lives of

others. A judge walks a tightrope between the law and humanity.

Comment: More bureaucratic tightrope walkers than guardians of justice. Irony: the gavel is more satisfying than those who wield it admit.

But beware: if you happen to find yourself disliked by one of them, think twice before speaking. Look them straight in the eye, and only state facts, never suppositions or inferences. Any hesitation, any misplaced word, and you will be doomed.

Judicial Police

An operational body serving the judiciary, the Judicial Police collects evidence, investigates crimes, and assists in the trial process. It intervenes behind the scenes of crime, transforming suspicions and facts into concrete evidence for justice.

Auctions at auction

A variant of judicial auctions, often public and competitive, to ensure maximum transparency.

Perception: Market events regulated by law; ambivalent perception between profit and failure.

Comment: They demonstrate how justice touches every aspect of society, even the economy of tangible goods.

Judicial Consultants

Professionals who support the courts with technical and specialized skills, from experts to industry experts.

Perception: Invisible but crucial; often considered technical arbiters of complexities that escape the pure law.

Comment: Without them, judicial decisions would risk

superficiality: they bring knowledge and concreteness to justice.

THE LAWYERS

Defenders or accusers, armed with words, strategies, and hypocrisy. They oscillate between heroes and troublemakers; beloved by desperate customers, feared by envious colleagues. Every harangue is a battle, every pause an opportunity to laugh at the absurdity of men in togas. Some are Shakespeare in times; others are peddlers of discount-store illusions. Irony: talk enough and the entire world becomes guilty of something.

Serious and Complete

Amid the din of courtrooms, the competition for visibility, and the power games disguised as legal procedures, there exists a category that does not bow to trends or shortcuts: serious and thorough lawyers. They do not seek applause; they do not want newspaper headlines. A practical, effective lesson.

- **The second.** A Romanian woman who opened a different world to me. I understood that women, in every way, are superior to us. I took notes like a high school student—dry throat, brain in disarray. The previous experience was not erased, it was updated, and I returned home with Romanian money. The first Italian to take money from a Romanian woman—stuff from a movie, my thing.

- **The third.** My current lawyer: he never loses—fifteen cases won in a row. I thought he had a pact with the judges. Instead, he gave me the final lesson: no advice about women; only respect and love, one by one. The law does not judge in unison. Me? I found my own little "association of good ideas"—no quorum, no boring rules.

In the end, laughing with them is inevitable. Those who are truly serious know that life is ridiculous sometimes; laughter is the only way to keep from going crazy—and sometimes it is even the strategy for winning a case without opening your mouth.

And the accused

They were in the prison interview room, the lawyer in front of the trial papers, the defendant on the other side of the glass.

"We screw them here," the lawyer said, calculating every move. "Here, they screw you."

So, five, ten steps back and forth, between strategies and calculations.

Finally, the defendant, with a hint of irony remaining, asked:

"Excuse me, lawyer... when we screw them there are ten of us, and when they screw me... am I alone?"

No one laughed. Because that "fucking" was no longer a game: the defendant received six life sentences. He no longer walked out of prison on his own two feet: he found himself lying in a place from which he would never get up.

And the lawyer? He continued to do his job, silent and precise, in that invisible cage where true power earns no applause but brings dire consequences.

Civilians

They manage contracts, inheritances, and other people's property. Invisible outside the courtroom, they are omnipresent in the lives of those who sign documents without reading them. They turn boring rules into death traps.

Criminal lawyers

to a car accident. And then you realize you have fallen into a twisted legal loophole, with no way out.

They have a piece of paper, but little substance. They cite articles, ignoring reality. They are dangerous only to those who listen to them too much. They have given satisfaction

to their parents, relatives, and friends, but they have wasted their time learning what they will never use.

Rumor has it that, as with the Carabinieri, officers' wives may have access to curiosities and secrets that go far beyond simple environmental protection.

Humor

Some say a forest ranger can spot a diseased tree from thirty meters away but cannot distinguish a lost tourist from a potential smuggler. Yet, amidst the jokes and smiles, the truth is always lurking what appears to be a carefree attitude often conceals a profound and systematic knowledge of the territory.

Italian Army

Guardians of peace... and good humor

The Italian Army has a widespread presence throughout the country, ready to protect citizens, infrastructure, and national values. At the same time, it operates in international missions, ensuring peace without ever engaging in excessive warfare: we are Italians, after all, and our history teaches us that we preach love and diplomacy before weapons.

And, if we think about it, no other people in the world have done what we have done: the Roman Empire taught us to conquer everything... and lose everything. A historical lesson that mixes grandeur and comedy, as if fate itself were playing chess with us, and we were the most reckless yet smiling pawns on the global chessboard.

Provocation

Despite its discipline and impeccable organization, the Italian Army is often perceived as an elegant yet unobtrusive entity: protection without oppression, presence without threat. Behind the soldier's smile lies the awareness of belonging to a tradition that has written pages of universal history.

Humor

It is said that if an Italian goes to war, he does so with elegance: helmet on, flag fluttering, and sarcasm ready to go. Because, in the end, even in the most serious missions, true Italian power lies in knowing how to laugh at oneself, while others plan conquests and we remember lost empires with a glass of wine in hand.

Ranks and roles of the Italian Army

Transversal professional functions

Internal Security Officer – border control and institutional protection.

Water – Transparent Gold

- Central theme: without water we do not exist, there is no energy, there is no oil, there is no gas.
- Privatization: companies that manage water as if it were a luxury good.
- Water Wars (Middle East, Africa, India–Pakistan).
- Bottled water: a business worth more than gold in the same volume.
- Paradox: we pay more for it than for gasoline per liter.

Nuclear – The Ghost in the Shadows

- France, USA, Russia, China: who produces, who sells technology, who buys.
- Civil nuclear power: “clean” energy or a bomb under your desk?
- Waste and safety: the eternal problem that no one solves.
- Italy: the referendum, the decommissioned power plants, dependence on foreign countries.
- Hypocrisy: We condemn nuclear power, but we buy energy produced by French nuclear power plants.

Nations With Deposits

- Map: Middle East (Saudi Arabia, Iraq, Iran, Kuwait, UAE), Russia, Venezuela, Nigeria.

- “Rich and poor together”: nations sitting on black gold that remain poor due to corruption or external manipulation.
- African paradox: continent richer in resources, poorer in development.

Oil Companies & Seven Sisters

- A brief history of the original 7 sisters → myth and dominion.
- The new sisters: Aramco, Gazprom, CNPC, Petrobras, Petronas, PDVSA, NIOC.
- Comment: From private monopoly to state monopoly, the face changes but not hunger.
- Narration: The “Puppet Game” – governments that pretend to rule but are ruled.

Worldwide Distribution

- How energy travels: oil pipelines, gas pipelines, tankers, LNG ships.
- Global “chokepoints”: Suez, Hormuz, Malacca → the points where peace or war is decided.
- Every liter you put in the tank has crossed more borders than a seasoned tourist.

Water – The True Master

- It is not just a natural resource: it is life, food, energy, agriculture.
- Without water there is no gasoline (extraction, refining, cooling).

- The water multinationals: Nestlé, Danone, Coca-Cola.
- Current and future water conflicts: the “next oil” will be transparent.
- Reflective conclusion: “Without water we would not exist, yet we treat it like any other commodity. It is the greatest folly of modernity.”

European Policies

In Brussels, they love to talk about the "Green Deal" and the "ecological transition." These words are as big as cathedrals, but in practice they become a sea of paperwork, deadlines, and obligations for small citizens and small businesses. They force you to replace your boiler, car, and windows, as if everyone had a concertina wallet. Meanwhile, those who pollute receive bonuses and "exemptions" because, they say, they provide jobs for thousands of people.

Europe provides incentives for photovoltaic, wind, and biogas. It is a shame that real money always ends up in the hands of those who already have enormous capital. The little house with two solar panels on the roof becomes just a campaign photo; the real profits are made by consortia, multinationals, and the crafty people who speculate on green certificates. And you, citizens, are left with increasingly expensive bills.

Reflection

The system of the same hands behind a thousand faces

The paradox is clear: **the real producers are always the same**, be they oil, gas, energy, water, or even related services. What changes is **the brand**, the marketing, the color of the campaigns, the promises of innovation or sustainability. The name on the bill or the billboard may change, but **the profit stream remains in the same pockets**.

Campaigns designed to attract diverse consumers—young people, families, green, tech, energy-efficient—change nothing in terms of real power. Every "diversification" serves to **create the illusion of choice**, while in practice **no one escapes the hidden monopoly**. The price does not reflect the true value of the good or service, but rather the control that a few large players exert over essential resources.

This is where the profound irony of the system emerges: **society becomes enslaved by the absence of real and accessible alternatives**. We cannot truly choose, we cannot escape inflated margins, and the average citizen pays for goods that **in nature or in their basic concept would be almost free** (water, sun, wind).

Political considerations

Plastic, condoms, and the theater of good intentions

Some parliamentarians had the brilliant idea of reducing plastic emissions by taxing condom manufacturers. The goal? Generating profits to be donated to the environment. The logic seemed straightforward: high consumption = high revenue = more money to save the planet.

But political reality was swifter. Other parliamentarians immediately pointed out that **limiting condom use would increase the risk of disease**, impacting healthcare spending. The health system added its point: we must allow humanity to reproduce, otherwise hospitals would remain empty, and with them millions of jobs.

The result? The proposal was rejected. Everyone goes back to their old habits: consumption continues, profits stay in the same pockets, and politicians applaud themselves, feigning innovation.

Bitter and ironic conclusion

Long live the environment... or rather, long live the ministry and its little theaters. Plastic remains, condoms too, and humanity continues to roam in the grand cinema of good intentions.

ECONOMY AND FINANCE

The real economy and international finance often seem like two separate worlds: one full of numbers, balance sheets, and graphs; the other, a vast theater where **the same producers and investors pull the strings**. It does not matter what brand, product, or service: behind the labels, only the colors, logos, and advertising campaigns change, but **the profits always end up in the same accounts**.

Direct provocation:

- Companies change their names to appear new and attract different consumers, but **the real capital remains concentrated**.

- Marketing campaigns make people believe in diversification, but **the real market offers no low-cost alternatives:** the system protects itself.
- The consumer is pushed to spend more, while those who control production **profit from every choice**, even the most apparently ecological or fair-trade ones.

In this context, even fiscal and financial policies, when they are truly innovative, **clash with the consolidated mechanisms of economic power**, and always end up favoring those who already have capital and influence.

Data and tools to highlight:

- **Central banks and large financial institutions:** the true drivers of the system, behind the actions of governments and markets.
- **Tax policies and tax breaks:** often ineffective if not accompanied by real control over the profit chain.
- **Public investments and incentives:** they only work if financial flows are not captured by large groups.

Bitter conclusion:

The global economy and finance function like an invisible web, where **the rules exist only for those who can circumvent them**, and the rest of the world watches, pays, and applauds the “democratic game” without ever utterly understanding who really wins.

Internal Roles

These are the internal pillars that run the ministry from within:

Minister of Economy and Finance

- The political leader decides the guidelines and strategies.
- It often becomes the public face of economic policies, even when the real power lies elsewhere.

Deputy Minister / Undersecretaries

- They support the Minister in specific areas: budget, taxes, state accounting.
- They control financial flows and relationships with public bodies.

General Directors of the Departments

- Budget and Treasury: manage the state's liquidity, bond issues, and public debt.
- Tax and Tax Control: supervising revenue, tax evasion, and tax policies.
- Investment and Public Finance Policies: direct funds and incentives to businesses and infrastructure projects.

Offices and Internal Services

- Economic and statistical analysis: they produce data and reports, often filtered through the official narrative.
- Control and verification: they verify public budgets and spending flows.

- Internal institutional relations: coordinate with other ministries and parliamentary committees.

External Roles

These roles are not part of the formal organizational chart but **control or strongly influence the ministry's choices**:

Banks and Financial Institutions

- Key intermediaries for public debt and capital flow management.
- They can influence fiscal policies through rates and the availability of credit.

Large Industrial and Financial Groups

- They receive incentives, tax breaks, and public funds, often in exchange for strategic production or targeted lobbying.

International Organizations

- IMF, World Bank, EU: they establish economic guidelines, influencing national choices.
- They set limits and targets on deficit, debt, and investment.

Economic Media and Analysts

- By shaping public and investor perception, they indirectly influence policies and priorities.

Direct and provocative comment

Inside the ministry, everything appears orderly, hierarchical, and bureaucratic, but **the real power often rests with external roles.** "Official" decisions are a cover: those who dictate the real course of action are banks, large corporations, and international organizations.

In practice, the ministry exists to **channel and justify flows already decided elsewhere**, while the public narrative celebrates it as the guardian of the national finances.

Tax Scheme

1. TAXES / FEES

- **Role:** Tax collection, management of the state budget, instruments of redistribution and social control.
- **Provocation:** It is the system that finances itself, creating constraints on citizens, while big capitals often find loopholes.

2. Accountants

- **Role:** Consulting on tax returns, payroll, and tax optimization.
- **Provocation:** They serve as indispensable "intermediaries" to avoid falling victim to the tax authorities, but they often protect the interests of those who can afford them.

3. Labor consultants

- **Role:** Management of contracts, salaries, contributions, and employment regulations.

- **Challenge:** Without them, companies and employees would be navigating by sight; with them, systems often remain tied to complex and opaque rules.

4. Revenue Agency

- **Role:** Operational arm for tax investigations, collection, and control.
- **Provocation:** An instrument of state power that often transforms legality into systemic pressure; real control rests with those who lack the resources to evade it.

Provocative summary:

This entire system creates an ecosystem where citizens and small businesses pay, undergo complex procedures, and require mandatory consultancy, while large capital flows and large corporations often remain beyond the real reach of control. Taxation thus becomes **an instrument of discipline and order, not of fairness.**

Guardia di Finanza – Roles and Functions

General role

- Military body with civilian district, dependent on the **Ministry of Economy and Finance.**
- Main functions: **protection of state revenues**, fight against tax evasion, control of illicit trafficking related to the economy.

- Provocation: a body that often moves as a **force of pressure rather than prevention**, striking those who have no resources to defend themselves.

Internal functions

- **Tax and accounting audits:** Verification of tax returns, investigations into tax evasion and fraud.
- **Inspections and assessments:** Company visits and document checks.
- **Specialized sections:** Anti-counterfeiting, anti-money laundering, cyber-economy.
- Provocation: they often operate only where the media or fiscal return is certain; large fortunes remain invisible.

External functions

- **Collaboration with other state agencies:** Police, Carabinieri, Revenue Agency.
- **International cooperation:** With other states to combat tax evasion and transnational fraud.
- Provocation: they function as **a link between political power and the citizen**, often rewarding the appearance of effectiveness rather than the actual fight against major tax evaders.

Key internal structure

General Command – Central and Strategic Direction.

Territorial operational departments – Conducting on-site investigations.

Special Investigative Sections – Complex investigations into tax fraud, economic and financial crime.

Connection to the Tax Office

- GDF **applies tax regulations**, intercepts irregularities, conducts seizures and notifies tax bills.
- Provocation: the tax system works as a two-tiered mechanism: citizens pay and are subject to strict controls, while large capitals often remain **protected by loopholes, tax havens, and expert consultancy**.

Reflective Note

The Guardia di Finanza is often seen as the tax authorities' armed wing, the body that goes after honest citizens and small businesses while large fortunes, the real ones, always remain untouchable. It is an institution that enforces the rules, but it does so **selectively**, focusing on what is visible and easily controllable.

It is the needle in the balance between the state and the citizen: on the one hand, it protects revenue, on the other, it represents a **constant pressure on the pockets of those who have no means to defend themselves**. The GDF shows the visible face of the tax system, while large flows of money, complex frauds, and tax havens remain in the shadows, protected by laws, consultants, and bureaucratic complications.

In this sense, the Guardia di Finanza is the symbol of a paradox: **a body that serves the state and defends fiscal order, but which often fails to address those truly responsible for global economic disorder.**

Long live legality, long live the appearance of effectiveness... and long live the illusion that the system is truly fair.

The GDF is the tip of the economic discipline iceberg. Its actions are visible, tough, and controlled, while the true flows of economic power remain **invisible and untouchable**. It is a body that "protects revenue" but often **fails to reach the true beneficiaries of global tax evasion.**

It happened yesterday

Over the past seven years, I have had several encounters with the Guardia di Finanza. Close inspections, summonses, interrogations... all normal, except that most of the time **the truth was on my side**, while they were pursuing conjectures and hypotheses.

I want to recall three episodes that left a mark on me, made me reflect, and even smile.

First meeting:

A Marshal, authorized by the prosecutor, was supposed to question me on matters attributed to me. His certainty of my alleged error was evident... until I asked him, *"Excuse me, but what authority do you have to discuss economics and business? Shouldn't you be dealing with taxes and criminal law, not marketing or economic strategies?"*

The result? The case was dismissed, no court was called, and a Marshal was forced to reckon with my calm and the truth.

Second meeting:

Eight people in the same barracks, interrogated on administrative and commercial matters. No one could contain the truth: my truth triumphed immediately. The tense atmosphere quickly dissolved, amidst absurd requests for gifts and personal confessions from officials... amidst vibrators and adventures in Southeast Asia.

Third meeting:

By now I knew everyone. After answering unfounded objections about the plotting of a carousel tax, they came to the final question: what I had to declare before the report was closed.

My answer was simple, direct, and... liberating:

"I love you all, as long as you don't arrest me and don't call me again."

Everyone laughed. And so, I remain in this author's story.

POST-SCRIPTUM – PROVOCATION

This book ends here, but the discussion does not end there. The truth is often inconvenient, and reality is manipulated by the usual powers. Those who read carefully know that nothing is left to chance: institutions, finance, multinationals, laws, and environmental policies are intertwined in a system that rewards a few and exploits many.

This postscript is not intended to provide answers, but to shake consciences, raise doubts, and provoke thought.

Five provocative aphorisms

Foreign Affairs

“Big international decisions don't change the world, only those who own the agenda and know how to bend others to their own convenience change.”

Interiors

“A ministry, a law, a bureaucrat: everything that appears independent often obeys invisible logic that the citizen does not suspect.”

Justice

"Those who investigate the truth often fail to recognize it; those who possess it bend it to their advantage. The law is the same for everyone, but power decides who truly respects it."

Defense and economy

“Security is a product to be sold, and the economy is a performance: citizens pay for their tickets and applaud without knowing who commands the stage.”

Environment

"As long as water is a commodity to be managed for profit, the world will remain thirsty. And taxing plastic alone won't save us from the system's thirst."

WHY WRITE THIS BOOK?

Because the world loves to tell the tales of big names, front-row figures, and high-profile headlines. But what about real life? Real life unfolds in the hands of those who remain invisible. Behind every stamp, every paperwork, every emergency, there is someone who works unseen, and often dies silently in the daily grind.

Because institutions talk about "transparency," but thrive on the shadows of those who keep them alive. Because there are heroes without medals, commanders without a platform, men and women who decide the fate of the country without anyone mentioning them.

I chose to author this book to give a voice to those who do not have one. To make those who usually snort in line laugh bitterly, to make those who ignore shudder, to make those who dare look reflect. It is not a tribute. It is not a denunciation. It is a dirty mirror: it reflects minor professions, caricatures of power, revealed secrets, small everyday heroisms, and silent tragedies.

Writing means making it visible. And if invisibility is the curse of these professions, then this book becomes the least possible compensation: to finally look them in the face.

Because no one has done it before. And someone had to.

"The Thousand Faces of Invisible Power" is more than just a book. It is an act of courage, a cry, an invitation to see what the world prefers to ignore.

COMMENT

Over the years, the Guardia di Finanza has represented a microcosm of power, rigidity, and human curiosity. My experiences show how confrontation with authority, even when intense and repetitive, can be managed with clarity, truth, and humor. Often, fear or peer pressure cannot withstand the clarity of the facts.

CONCLUSION

The meeting with the Guardia di Finanza was not an obstacle, but rather a training ground for observation: understanding how procedures work, how offices operate, and how individuals react to power and truth. Justice can be rigid, but logic and balance need no defenses, only clarity and firmness.

CONSIDERATIONS

Those who operate within the mechanisms of the state often cannot see beyond their own box: rules, protocols, minutes. It is important to remember that people, with their emotions and limitations, remain behind uniforms. The truth is a weapon no one can ignore emerges, inevitably, even in the most controlled and formal situations.
