Then one day, you begin to count your own years. Funeral notices remind you that people die, and age is nothing more than a date placed somewhere inside a lifetime.

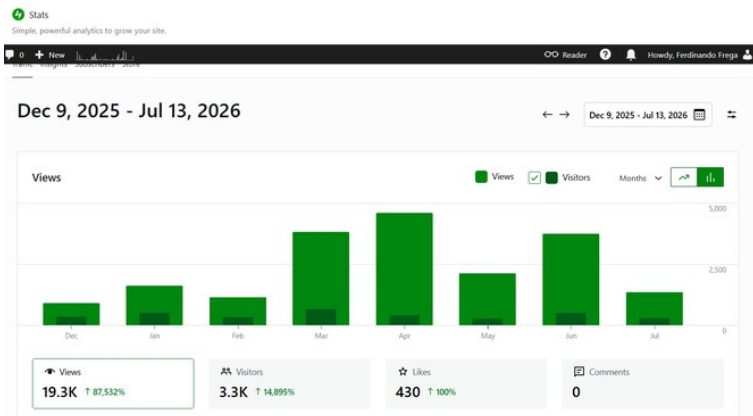
That is when your personal balance sheet arrives.
